Working & Living

Objectives

Generally, the inspection pursues two main objectives:

- 1) The ship was in compliance, and
- the ship <u>is</u> in compliance

with the requirements of Part A (Standards) of the MLC 2006 Convention.

The inspection thus aims at both the past and the future.

The purpose of the inspection is to determine compliance with the requirements <u>but</u> PSCOs may also be entrusted with handling complaints made by seafarers on ships visiting their ports. Therefore, Inspectors examine existing documents and records suitable to demonstrate compliance, particularly such as

- SEA
- Records on hours of work & rest Hours
- Records on inspections
- Public posting incl. last inspection, DMLC II, complaint procedure
- Logs of drills & trainings

and carry out crew interviews to get an impression of the living and working conditions and to check the implementation of the requirements. Together with the general impression and results of interviews, a picture emerges.

Unintentional Negligence

Some of the regularly detected deficiencies are caused in everyday life by small administrative negligence, e.g. a record for which a signature was missing. Administrative documents have to be reviewed regularly and carefully.

Try to avoid even the smallest deviations. If an inspector notices one, correct it immediately on site! The recording of a defect may be prevented if this type of deficiency is rectified immediately.

Common deficiencies noted

Seafarers' employment agreement (SEA) & Wages

- SEA expired and seafarer not signed off in time / SEA expired and extended but the extension does not meet the conditions of the flag State / copy of SEA & referenced bargaining agreement not on board
- Wages not paid in time at the end of the month. Account of payment incomplete or not available

Hours of Work & Rest

- Non-compliance with maximum hours of work, minimum hours of rest or periods of rest. Permitted conflict with hours of rest or work but no records were made which demonstrate the cause for conflict and the compensatory measures
- Sheets not signed

Occupational health and safety

- Unsafe electrical installations, floor in front of switch boards are not insulated against electric shock
- Cleanliness of engine room (poor condition, slippery surface, incomplete floor plates, missing guards/rails, tools damaged / incomplete, unsafe illumination, fire hazards, uncontrolled stored hazardous substances)
- Ropes & wires particularly moorings: poor condition. No regular inspections done, no records available
- PPE not provided / not maintained with poor condition

Accommodation

- Unhygienic condition, not maintained or have damaged facilities / equipment
- Heating or air conditioning system not fully operational or not maintained with a poor hygienic standard

Various

 Not posted at a public space: MLC certificate, last MLC inspection report, DMLC I, DMLC II, complaint procedure, financial security, abandonment, table of shipboard working arrangement

Crew

- Ship not manned in accordance with the MSM Minimum Safe Manning, Seafarer's qualifications not in accordance with the MSM
- Personal certificates, e.g. cert. of competency or medical fitness, not available or expired

Food & Galley

- Stores & areas of preparation not clean, unhygienic or damaged. Hazardous food storage, poor temperature control for refrigerated food. Food expired
- Drinking water test not conducted / expired

Common grounds for PSC detention

- Seafarers' employment agreement (SEA)
- Extended contract and sea service beyond SEA
- Cleanliness of engine room
- Wages
- Sanitary facilities
- Work & rest hours
- Young seafarers / uncontrolled conditions

Further information that may be of interest

ILO, Guidelines for port State control officers carrying out inspections under the Maritime Labour Convention, 2006, as amended

General

A PSCO should gain an impression of whether the ship is well maintained and operated and may observe situations or practices that suggest that the working and living conditions on the ship may be inconsistent with the requirements of the MLC, 2006.

Primary purpose is to review the MLC certificate and DMLC and related documentation and records.

A more detailed inspection may be carried out as consequence of documentary inconsistencies or noncompliances, in case of a complaint by a seafarer filed on- scene or prior inspection or if the PSCO has clear grounds to believe that aspects of the living and working conditions on a ship are not in compliance with the MLC, 2006.

Examples that may warrant a detention

- Presence of any seafarer on board under the age of 16
- Health hazards to young seafarers with age 16y-18y
- Fundamental rights of the seafarer violated
- Insufficient manning
- Not in possession of valid seafarers SEA
- Not in possession of valid seafarers certificates
- Repeatedly working beyond max. hours of work
- Repeatedly having less than min. hours of rest
- Unhygienic or damaged accommodation / cabins
- Unhygienic or damaged sanitary facilities
- Unhygienic or damaged food and mess areas
- Quality or quantity of food and water not suitable
- Medical equipment, medicines, guide not suitable
- Non-payment of wages (repeated, significant period)
- Inadequate wage account
- Significant work place hazard to seafarer
- Other condition or instance because of the seriousness
